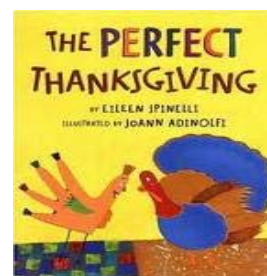

## Domestic Violence

Here's another story from a domestic violence victim:

“As a victim of domestic violence, I recall enduring the painful experience of being choked as I gasped for air to save my life and the life of my unborn child. I survived that day, and with two black eyes, delivered my child thirty days later,” begins **Independent Future Executive Senior Sales Director Linda Johnson Thomas.**

“The last time I was under the same roof with my abuser, who was my husband at that time, the only thing that separated us was a .45 automatic weapon,” she continues.

Linda, who met her former husband while she was in college, endured harrowing physical and verbal abuse during her marriage.

“Although our courtship seemed normal, right after our wedding, things changed. Even my former husband’s demeanor and voice inflection became different. Over time, the incidents and magnitude of violence escalated,” she recalls.

“My mother was a domestic violence victim. And while I didn’t witness the domestic violence taking place, some things are unspoken. There is no healing in silence.”

Fortunately, Linda escaped her abusive situation and has chosen to speak out to help heal others.

“I formed an intimate relationship with God, and God restored me,” explains Linda. “Affirmations, encouragement and recognition helped build my self-esteem and self-worth.”

In December 2009, Linda helped raise money needed for beds so the local domestic violence shelter could operate at full capacity. In addition to many other fundraising efforts, for more than 17 years she has been passionately committed to raising awareness and educating the public about domestic violence.

In 2005, she began a domestic violence ministry through her church. This ministry provides legal information to assist victims in making their way through the civil or criminal justice system and refers victims to emergency shelters. Linda also conducts workshops to enable victims to heal from the emotional scars and rebuild their disrupted lives.

In February 2009, her testimony before the Maryland House Judiciary Committee was instrumental in getting two domestic violence bills passed.

On May 19, 2009, the Governor of Maryland, Martin O’Malley, signed those bills into law, making them effective Oct. 1, 2009. As a result of her tireless advocacy, Linda was recently appointed to the Board of Directors for Maryland Legislative Agenda for Women, a statewide coalition of women’s groups and individuals that advocates for progressive legislation and policies that promote and protect the well being of women and their families. “We must educate all people and help break the cycle of violence from a preventative standpoint,” Linda states. “Domestic violence does not discriminate. Domestic violence did not care that I was educated and from a Christian family. Domestic violence is a pervasive problem that exists not only in our local communities but nationwide. The cycle of violence is repetitive and unrelenting. If we save one life, all the effort is worth it, says Linda. I’m grateful to be doing small things in a big way.”




